This is a great time for students to reflect on their reports from 2022 and put measures into place to allow them to continue working well or to improve in areas which require development. Care Group teachers and Coordinators are a great resource here, so we encourage students to meet with these key teachers to set some goals and strategies for their way forward; as often as possible.

Towards the end of 2022 and also this year, the College has been exploring how we develop positive behaviour in our community. Leaders and staff have been training in 'Restorative Practices,' which is a whole school teaching and learning approach that encourages behaviour that is supportive and respectful. It places the onus on individuals to be truly accountable for their behaviour and to repair any harm caused to others as a result of their actions.

A restorative approach focuses on building, maintaining and restoring positive relationships, particularly when incidents that involve interpersonal conflict or wrongdoing occur. There is much evidence that when a restorative approach to relationships across the school community is prioritised, and adequate staff training and support for implementation is provided, schools can reduce the frequency of behaviour incidents and improve school culture. This approach to behaviour development and relationships is internationally renowned for its effectiveness and staff are looking forward to working towards implementing Restorative Practices into our work on a daily basis, across all areas of the school.

As a College, there will also be opportunities to involve our wider community in this practice. And this is very exciting because we see it not only developing our students and equipping them for their future but key to this is also involving our wider community. As they say, "it takes a village to raise a child."

IB Middle Years Programme News

I take this opportunity to thank the Good Shepherd Lutheran College community for welcoming me to Howard Springs. A few important points from me regarding our students from Years 6 to 10:

Three-way Conferences

Thank you to all families who were able to arrange time to meet with teachers. The **open communication** and support between parents and teachers most certainly **positively impact** a child's approach to their learning at school. For any feedback which may assist future optimisation of our Three-way Conferences, please contact me. Our next face-to-face conferences will be



Student-led Conferences in Term 3 which will take a slightly different format to the conferences of Term 1. More information to follow later this year.

Term 1 Learning Area Units

Across all Learning Areas every child is investigating a topic and a key concept. Think of topics as the knowledge and content, and concepts as the big ideas. The IB states,

"Concepts are big ideas that have relevance within specific disciplines and across subject areas. MYP students use concepts as a vehicle to inquire into issues and ideas of personal, local and global significance and examine knowledge holistically. The MYP prescribes sixteen key interdisciplinary concepts along with related concepts for each discipline."

For example, Year 7 students in World Studies are investigating Ancient Egypt, and the concept of Relationships. In Drama, the concept of Identity is being investigated through the topic of Storytelling. In Mathematics, the same Year 7 students are investigating the topic of Integers through the concept lens of Communication. Please ask your child about what topics and concepts they are investigating through the Learning Areas. See below all 16 key concepts investigated across all Learning Areas from Years 6-10:

GSLC IB World School MYP Key Concepts



Communities are groups that exist in proximity defined by space, time or relationship. Communities include, for example, groups of people sharing particular characteristics, beliefs or values as well as groups of interdependent organisms living together in a specific habitat.

Aesthetics

Aesthetics deals with the characteristics, creation, meaning and perception of beauty and taste. The study of aesthetics develops skills for the critical appreciation and analysis of art, culture and nature.

Relationships

Relationships are the connections and associations between properties, objects, people and ideas-including the human community's connections with the world in which we live.

Connections

Connections are links, bonds and relationships among people, objects, organisms or ideas.

Time, space and place Ident

The intrinsically linked concept of time, space and place refers to the absolute or relative position of people, objects and ideas. Time, place and space focuses on how we construct and use our understanding of location ("where" and

"when").

Systems

Systems are sets of interacting or interdependent components. Systems provide structure and order in human, natural and built environments. Systems can be start of dynamic, simple or complex.

Global interactions

Global interactions, as a concept, focuses on the connections among individuals and communities, as well as their relationships with built and natural environments, from the perspective of the world as a whole.

Logic

Logic is a method of reasoning and a system of principles used to build arguments and reach conclusions. Identity is the state or fact of being the came, it refers to the particular features that define individuals, groups, things, even, places, symbols and styles. Identity can be shownyed, or it can be constructed, asteriod and shaped by extremal and internal influences.

Culture

Culture encompasses a range of learned and shared beliefs, values, Interests, attitudes, products, ways of knowing and patterns of behaviour created by human sommunities. The sensept of culture is dynamic and organic.

Communication

Communication is the exchange or transfer of signals, facts, ideas and symbols. It requires a sender, a message and as intended receiver. Communication involves the activity of conveying information or meaning. Effective communication requires a common "ianguage" (which may be written, spoken or non-verbal).

Development

Development is the act or process of growth, progress or evolution, sometimes through iterative improvements.



Creativity is the process of generating novel ideas and considering existing ideas from new perspectives. Creativity includes the ability to recognize the value of ideas when developing innovative responses to problems; it may be evident in process as well as outcomes, products or solutions.

Change

Change is a conversion, transformation or movement from one form, state or value to another, inquiry into the concept of change involves understanding and evaluating sauses.

Perspective

Perspective is the pasition from which we observe situations, objects, facts, ideas and opinions. Perspective may be associated with individuals, groups, cultures or disciplines. Different perspectives often lead to multiple representations and interpretations.

Form

Form is the shape and underlying structure of an entity or piece of work, including its organization, essential nature and external appearance.

IB Middle Years Programme News - continued

Term 1 Summative Tasks

Each Learning Area has one summative task due toward the end of this term. A summative task is formally assessed using at least 2 of the 4 criteria per Learning Area. Each task will now be available to view through your child's SEQTA online system. This means that by the end of this term, you will have a clear understanding of your child's formally assessed progress across all Learning Areas. If your child cannot see these tasks on SEQTA, please contact your child's teacher.

Personal Project

For Year 10 students in their final year of the MYP, each student will undertake a Personal Project. By this stage, your child should have met once with their teacher-mentor and devised a product goal. Ask your child about their product goal. A clear product goal should be phrased in this way: *I want to learn... and my product will be...*. If your child has not met with their teacher-mentor to date and needs assistance with a clear and challenging product goal, please contact Nathan Loughran, Personal Project Coordinator, as a matter of urgency.

NAPLAN 2023

Students of Years 7 and 9 will commence their **4 NAPLAN tests** from Wednesday 15 March. I have strived to ensure that disruption to our regular teaching and learning programme across the campus has been kept to a minimum during this time. If your child is in Year 7 or 9, please assist by ensuring they have the **latest NAPLAN lockdown browser installed** on their device, devices are fully charged on the morning of each scheduled test, and the latest operating system updates have

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been installed. Corded headphones are required for some tests - and these can be provided by the school - although students may prefer to bring their own.

Attendance

Finally from me, a matter of great importance. Please see **punctual and consistent attendance** of your child at school as the singly most valuable factor in your child's success as a learner in our MYP. For unavoidable and prolonged absences, your child can access SEQTA to keep up with at least part of the task expectations if it is conducive to do so. Keeping abreast of in-class progress greatly assists with easing anxiety and prevents gaps in learning when coming back to school. Thank you to our parents and carers who strive for 100% attendance of your child.

Year 6 Mathematics


Well done Year 6B students and teacher Mrs Flavell on a great mathematics lesson in Week 2.


