At GSLC, we see inquiry in action during events like Science Week, where students engage in exciting experiments or participate in the Science Week online quiz. We are half way through term 3. Our fantastic teachers continue to connect before content (a restorative practice) to develop and maintain relationships with their students.

Rosie the therapy dog and wellbeing officer Mr Mike have returned visiting to support students in wellbeing where groups of children are continuing to focus on communication and social skills with them.

Our teachers continue to use restorative practices at our campus where students involved in conflict can share their experiences by being listened to, understood, and given the opportunity to provide a solution to help fix the problem. Restorative practice also allows the student or students responsible for the hurt to be heard and given the opportunity to make amends.

It is our responsibility as teachers and parents to continue to teach social skills to help children develop and grow friendships. When our children have positive interactions with their peers they will encounter fewer problems.

The SEARCH framework continues to guide our wellbeing practices in classrooms. Teachers are guided by the following concepts: strengths, emotional management, awareness and attention, relationships, coping and habits and goals. These important skills are implemented through the units of inquiry in each classroom to support the development of children.

Wellbeing at school enables students to develop such skills as communication. Students could be learning to use manners or developing the skills to solve problems. These positive social skills help students develop respectful and positive relationships. Students also learn empathy and to value differences through

By giving students encouragement and practice through activities such as games and role plays, we can all help to develop important skills like listening, speaking, winning, and losing.

Helping your child or children create new games at home will support this learning too. Enjoy the rest of the term. I will speak to you soon (Ka korero ahau ki a koutou).

In our Unit of Inquiry – Sharing the planet, Year One students have been learning about the impact that humans have on the environment. After researching an Australian animal of their choice, the students wrote an information report to record and share what they had found out. They used non-fiction books from the library and ICT to find their animal's habitat, diet and four additional interesting facts.

After being inspired by a video of a laughing kookaburra that Mrs Campbell took in the backyard of her home, the students used Claire Saxby's 'Kookaburra' to learn more. This led to the students learning about hybrid texts, where authors use narrative and information to create a text that both entertains and informs.

To extend on learning about human impact, the students also learnt about the responsibility that we have in lessening impact and preserving the environment. We explored how the 3 Rs, 'Reduce Reuse Recycle', can help us to take care of the planet. This gave our class a great opportunity to join the Year 3 class on an excursion to watch 'The Whale's Tale' at the Darwin Museum. A great experience for all.





SCIENCE WEEK

National Science Week is a celebration of science and technology. In Sports House groups students carried out a variety of STEM challenges.

To start the day Ms Anver did a cabbage litmus experiment. Using different substances such as lemon juice and bi-carb she changed the colour of water from purple to pink or blue, depending on its' pH level.

Strauss experimented with different shaped paper bridges to see which design could hold the most blocks.

Fenton constructed paper rockets to blast off with a straw.

Hughes built and raced homemade balloon cars. There were lots of variables involved in the project and it took problem solving to determine which variable would need to be altered to make the car move the fastest. This activity was a great way to explain how wind energy can be used to propel an object.

Livingstone made 'Whirlybirds.' The students supported each other while they created and tested their 'Whirlybirds.' They tested for size, shape and weight. Weights were applied using paperclips and some students changed the shape of the wings of the 'Whirlybird.' The students really enjoyed making and watching them fly to the ground.

Years One and Two combined for science rotations. Students explored their sense of taste with Mrs Campbell, sweet, salty and sour to name a few. Miss Lisa had a tricky time getting popcorn to dance in a jar and Mrs Kitsos, dressed and inspired by Albert Einstein, constructed solar ovens to make chocolate covered biscuits.



Crossing the road safely
