Visible Wellbeing Coordinator's Article

At Good Shepherd Lutheran College Leanyer campus, the teachers are continuing to use Restorative Practices. This means that if there is any conflict or hurt, students can share their experience by being heard, understood, and given the chance to provide a solution to help fix the problem. Students responsible for the hurt also can be heard and are given the opportunity to make amends.

It is important that as teachers and parents, we continue to teach children personal and social skills to help them develop their friendships. If students' interactions with their peers are positive, they will have fewer problems.

Visible Wellbeing is also an ongoing practice at our school. Teachers are guided by the SEARCH framework which covers the following concepts: strengths, emotional management, awareness and attention, relationships, coping and habits and goals. These are all important skills to continue developing throughout your child or children's development and are also implemented through our Units of Inquiry.

Visible Wellbeing enables students to develop such skills as communication. Students could be learning to use manners or developing skills to solve problems. These positive social skills help develop respectful and positive relationships. Students also learn empathy and to value differences through collaboration and cooperation.

By giving students encouragement and practice through activities such as games and role play, we can all help to develop important skills like listening, speaking, winning, and losing.



Our learning in Year 1

In Year 1, in our Unit of Inquiry 'Sharing the Planet', we have been learning that 'All living things have requirements to help them grow and stay healthy'. Science Week in ELC

It is Science Week this week and so each day we have done an experiment. Some of them have been things that have happened really quickly and others have required time to see any change. On Monday we combined bicarb soda and vinegar to make a reaction, and then compared it to elephant toothpaste. On Tuesday we placed celery in water with food colouring which we were able to see a difference on Wednesday when the leaves showed the colour. On Wednesday we made a crawling colours experiment by getting the food dye to move through the paper towel and mix together to make new colours. On Thursday we watched colours move through water from smarties, and on Friday we made colours move in milk by themselves by adding drips of detergent.

Our current unit of inquiry explores how technology expands our ability to explore the universe. The evening aimed to help students understand Earth's place in the solar system as well as some of the unique features of the universe. The children didn't let this hinder their spirits, they had a blast playing with their friends and eating a sausage sizzle.
