UNIFORMS:

While we are almost at the end of the year it is still a requirement that students are wearing full school uniform.

Uniform Regulations

Complete and correct uniform, as determined by the College Board, is to be worn at all times and must be kept clean and in good condition. The uniform is to be worn at all times except on days with lessons that specifically require the sports uniform or on days formally designated as allowing different dress. It is not permitted to mix elements of the formal and sports uniforms.

Please remember that black shoes need to be worn with the formal uniform. They need to be entirely black and not have white soles. Junior school students are permitted to wear navy or black sandals.

Students wear their PE uniforms on Tuesdays (not house shirts) and they can wear their house shirts on Fridays. Sports shoes are to be exercise or running shoes only. Skate shoes, slip on shoes, canvas shoes or any other unsupportive shoe are unacceptable.

Students are to wear plain white socks with all school uniforms.

HATS:

The College bucket/sports hat is an integral part of the College uniform. A 'no hat no play' policy exists at the College and so students require a college hat to play.

HAIR:

Students with hair longer than the top of the shoulder must have all long hair tied back and up from the face using plain blue or black hair ties. Plain blue or black ribbons may also be worn. Hair shorter than shoulder length may be held back with a plain blue or black headband or clips. Hair clips are to be plain bobby pins or hair clips. Colour combs and/or decorative clips are not permitted.

JEWELLERY is limited to the following:

- Wristwatch.
- Small silver or gold cross and chain.
- Students with pierced ears may wear small studs (less than 5mm) and sleepers/hoops (less than 10 mm diameter).
- A maximum of two earrings in each lower earlobe is permitted. Clear, plastic studs for maintaining additional holes in ears is acceptable (including helix piercings).
- Students with nose piercings may wear small (less than 5mm) clear plastic studs.
- No other facial piercings or clear fillers are permitted.
- Medical bracelets/anklets/necklaces may be worn.

While every attempt has been made to provide unambiguous guidance regarding acceptable jewellery / accessories, it is impossible to cover all possibilities. In all cases the intention of the policy is that students maintain a professional appearance which will be at the discretion of the Head of School/Principal.

Primary Year Programme

A foundational element of the PYP is the 7 Key Concepts that are central to how we help students explore and make sense of the world around them. These concepts not only shape what students learn but also how they learn. They encourage inquiry, critical thinking, and reflection. Here's a breakdown of how the Key Concepts support your child's development:

- 1. Form: What is it like?
- How this helps:

Children become more observant, discerning, and capable of describing the world around them. It supports their ability to classify, compare, and identify patterns.

- 2. Function:
 - How does it work?
 - How this helps:

Your child will develop problem-solving skills and gain an understanding of systems and processes in everyday life. This thinking helps them approach challenges with creativity and resilience.

- 3. Causation: Why is it like this?
- How this helps:

Children become better at understanding cause and effect. It fosters their ability to make predictions and to think logically about how different factors interact.

4. Change: How is it changing?

How this helps:

our child learns to navigate change with adaptability. They also understand the patterns that underlie change, whether in history, nature, or personal development.

5. Connection: How is it connected to other things?

How this helps:

Your child will build their understanding of interrelatedness and develop a broader perspective on global and local issues. They will begin to think about how their actions impact others and the environment.

6. Perspective: What are the points of view?

How this helps:

Your child learns to appreciate diversity and to challenge their own assumptions. They develop the ability to see situations from multiple viewpoints, fostering open-mindedness and tolerance.

- 7. Responsibility: What is our responsibility?
 - How this helps:

Children learn to take ownership of their actions and to consider the ethical implications of their decisions. This encourages active citizenship, environmental stewardship, and social awareness.

How These Concepts Benefit Your Child

In the PYP, we focus on making learning meaningful by addressing these concepts through inquiry-based learning. Instead of simply memorising facts, your child will engage in deep investigations that encourage them to ask questions, seek answers, and make

connections. These concepts support the development of critical thinking, problem-solving, and collaboration—skills that will serve them well in school and beyond.

As parents, you can support your child's learning by encouraging them to ask questions like: "What is it like?" "Why do you think this is happening?"

"How is this connected to other things?"

By showing interest in these questions, you're helping your child develop a mindset of curiosity and exploration that will last a lifetime.

Thank you for being an important part of your child's learning journey. Together, we can foster a love of inquiry that will empower them to think deeply, act responsibly, and become active global citizens.

Buzz the Blue Tongue


We have a class pet named **Buzz**. He is a Common Blue Tongue lizard – maybe you have one of his cousins in your backyard?

We borrowed Buzz from Tom at Top End Critters. We feed him about twice a week. You might have met him if you've visited our classroom. He is very wriggly! He loves to run around and jump out of your lap so we have to make sure we hold him properly – one hand under his front legs and the other hand under his back legs.

Here are some of our favourite Blue Tongue lizard facts:



Romain – they have a blue tongue so that predators think they are poisonous.



Lara – Some Blue Tongues are coloured brown to camouflage with dead leaves and twigs on the ground

Sean – the holes in the side of it's head are ears. Scarlett – A Shingleback Blue Tongue has a bobtail that looks like it's head. It puts it up when a predator comes so the predator thinks it's his head and attacks it. Then he can turn around and bite the predator and run away. Sean – Every Blue Tongue lizard can drop their tails (except for the Shingleback). They do this to distract the predator so they can run away. The tail keeps wriggling after it has detached.

Isaac – When they are scared, they flatten themselves to appear bigger. Romain – the Blotched Blue Tongue Lizard is yellow and orange so predators think it's poisonous





Isaac – Pygmy Blue Tongues live in holes.

Jack – You can't have a Pygmy Blue Tongue as a pet because they are endangered




Year 5




