Continuous reporting

What Are Restorative Practices?

Invasive Species - Years 4 & 5

Year 4 and 5 had visitors from Northern Territory Bio Security. They taught us about invasive species.

We explored four different types of fruit flies. We learnt how some are dangerous to Australian agriculture because they lay eggs inside our fruit.

We also learnt that some fruit flies are exotic and live in Papua New Guinea, but island hop to Australia. The flies can also come into Australia on ships, clothes, shoes and wood.

When we travel overseas bio security dogs sniff our bags to ensure there is no fruit and pests. Carryon luggage goes through Xray machines at the airport and is checked by bio security.

Bio security set fruit fly traps in the Northern Territory to stop them eating our mangoes.

We tried to identify different types of fruit flies by examining their bodies, wings and bridge. It worked well because we had a key to help us.

Now we are growing our own fruit flies to see how quickly they hatch and become flies.

We enjoyed learning about the fruit flies because we analysed them closely.

The students coloured their own picture which was then joined together to make a quilt, which was revealed at the end of the day. It is displayed in the front office if you would like to see it.


























Presentation of Transition Bibles






