Empowering Young Changemakers: Understanding "Action" in the IB PYP

In the International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme (PYP), Action is a powerful part of your child's learning journey. It's not just something students do—it's something they feel inspired to take on when their learning connects deeply with the world around them.

Action in the PYP can be individual or collective, and it often grows naturally from the questions and passions students explore in class. It may start with a simple curiosity or concern, then evolve into a purposeful response. Whether it's organising a classroom recycling program, writing letters to local leaders, or making lifestyle changes to reduce waste, every action begins with meaningful learning.



The IB Learner Profile attributes—such as being caring, principled, open-minded, and reflective—are key to inspiring action. When students take action, they are living these attributes in real ways. They become internationally minded learners, recognising that their actions can contribute to a better and more peaceful world.

Types of student-initiated action might include:



Participation: getting involved in school or community activities.

Advocacy: speaking up for a cause they believe in.

Social Justice: challenging unfairness and promoting equity.

Social Entrepreneurship: creating solutions to local or global problems.

Lifestyle Choices: making personal changes that reflect their values.

While action starts with students, it is supported and strengthened by the entire learning community. Teachers guide, model, and encourage thoughtful action. Families, too, play a vital role by listening, asking questions, and helping children put their ideas into practice. Sometimes, adult support is needed to help make action possible or sustainable.

In the PYP, we believe that even our youngest learners can make a difference. By taking action, students learn that their ideas matter, their voice counts, and they can be part of shaping a better future. We love to celebrate action taken by our students, so please feel free to share actions taken by your child with our college community via your child's teacher. We're always excited to see our students make a difference and contribute to our global community.

From our Wellbeing Coordinator

Here at Good Shepherd Lutheran School Leanyer Campus, we are proud to continue our journey with restorative practices being the heart of our school culture. These practices are not merely strategies for managing conflict; they are woven into every interaction, helping to create a safe, respectful, and connected learning environment.

We understand that strong, positive relationships are the foundation for both successful learning and the development of healthy behaviours, therefore, social and emotional skills are explicitly taught and reinforced daily. By nurturing these abilities, we foster more positive interactions and reduce challenges across our school community.



Teachers continue to hone their skills in using 'Circles' to build and maintain healthy relationships. Circles provide a safe, respectful space where students can speak freely, fostering trust and open communication. They help develop listening skills, encourage sharing, and establish rules for respectful behaviour. Circles also promote a strong sense of community, and the incorporation of energiser games adds a fun dimension. Additionally, they empower students to solve problems collaboratively and build their agency.

Another important strategy we use is affective statements to model feelings for students, along with lessons on emotional granularity, helping students develop greater emotional awareness and expression.

Teaching and learning of social and emotional skills across the school continues through the SEARCH framework within units of inquiry. Ask your child about the wellbeing activities taking place in their classroom.

Finally, one of our most beloved wellbeing initiatives continues with visits from Rosie the therapy dog and our Wellbeing Officer, Mr. Mike. Rosie works with students to enhance their communication and social skills in a relaxed and supportive environment.

At home, you can continue to support your child's social skill development by engaging in fun, relationship-building activities. Creating games with unique rules can encourage communication, cooperation, and connection.

Together, both at school and at home, we can help our children develop the confidence and skills to form positive relationships that enhance their wellbeing.

Last week the water resource people came to teach Year 4 and 5 about water and the water cycle.

We learnt about the water cycle and how we get rain and water to drink. We learnt when it rains the water goes into the ground and people use water bores to bring drinking water up in rural areas.

We demonstrated where the water goes into the earth using food dye and putting it into a pipe on a model that showed us different layers of the ground. The food dye seeped through moving to the lowest land point.

We learnt that when people put oil at the dump it will spread into the soil. If you dump things shield it with clay.

The classes tested for water velocity in a pretend river made from pipe and water from the hose. It was interesting when we measured the water with a special fan and multiplied numbers to find this out. Most of the data we collected told us the water was running at one litre per second.

We had so much fun learning about water.


Transition


