At the end of each semester, you will receive a report that reflects your child's progress in relation to the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards. These reports are thoughtfully prepared by our dedicated teaching team, who use their understanding of each student's learning needs to tailor learning goals that support and challenge them.

Our classrooms are diverse, with students working at different stages of their learning journey. Our teachers are skilled in creating inclusive learning environments where all students can thrive. We focus not just on what students know, but on how they learn—encouraging them to take on challenges, develop resilience, and celebrate their progress.

In the Primary Years Programme (PYP), student reports go beyond academic performance. They also highlight the development of important learning behaviours and personal qualities, including the Approaches to Learning Skills and the Learner Profile attributes. These elements are central to your child's holistic development and are nurtured across all areas of school life.


Our end-of-semester reports include PYP grade descriptors, rated from 1 to 7, to help you clearly understand how your child is progressing across subject areas. #### From our Wellbeing Coordinator

Tena Koutou Katoa (Hello to you all)

It has been an extremely busy term. Connecting before content (a restorative practice) has been highlighted and the need to maintain it as part of good practice in classrooms. This enables the ongoing building of relationships between students and teachers daily and sets the tone in classrooms for the day.

Wellbeing officer, Mr Mike and Rosie the therapy dog continue to visit us regularly to support students' wellbeing. Their key focus is on communication and social skills with students.



At school, we place a strong focus on helping students develop their emotional management skills through the SEARCH framework. This includes building emotional literacy, understanding and regulating emotions, expressing feelings appropriately, recognising moods, fostering pleasant emotions, and practising gratitude.

Why is this important? A child's ability to understand and manage their emotions directly impacts how they interact with others—in the classroom, on the playground, and at home. These essential life skills help children recognise their emotional responses, label them accurately, and express them in healthy, respectful ways. For example, learning when and how to express anger appropriately is a key part of emotional self-regulation.

When children can understand their own emotions, they are more likely to stay motivated, focus on tasks, and persist through challenges. Emotional awareness also helps them build strong, respectful friendships and relationships.

Equally important is the ability to recognise and understand the emotions of others. Talking with your child about how someone else might be feeling helps build empathy and compassion. These are the foundations of meaningful, caring relationships. Children also begin to understand that their moods can be managed and adjusted depending on the situation, which is a powerful tool for lifelong wellbeing.

You can support your child's emotional development at home through simple conversations, daily interactions, and even games. With the holidays upon us this is a wonderful opportunity to come up with an activity such as charades, roleplay or create a new game to play as a family over the holidays. These are fun and meaningful ways to reinforce emotional awareness and connection.

Together, we can continue to nurture emotionally aware, resilient, and empathetic learners at school and at home.

#### Biodiversity in Schools - Years 4 & 5

This year, we are partnering with Scholastic to host our Book Fair.


This will offer a wonderful opportunity for families to support our library through purchasing quality books for home reading and to increase the library resources through 30-40% commission on sales.


